2023 NFPA Annual Conference and Technical meeting resulted in successful participation by ten (10) WHEA members. The NFPA healthcare committee chair and vice-chair personally acknowledged and thanked our WHEA contingent for our participation. Content wise, the future 2024 editions of NFPA 101 and NFPA 99 were debated and successfully passed for NFPA final publication.
